how the calendar works

Each month introduces a new animal, two colors, and five basic phrases. These vocabulary builders appear one day at a time and are repeated every week. By month's end, your child has heard these common words at least four times. Some of the phrases are questions such as "What colors do you see?" while others are spirited commands like "Let's count the dogs!" Both are designed to actively engage your *kinder* in the process of learning a second language.

pronunciation guides

kinderKALENDARS® come with a pronunciation guide for Chinese, French, Italian, Korean, and Spanish vocabulary. The French, Italian, and Spanish editions also feature a pronunciation guide for English vocabulary for native French, Italian, and Spanish speakers.

The pronunciation guides give the phonetic pronunciation of more than 75 vocabulary words including all the animals and colors featured in the calendar as well as the vocabulary for days of the week, months of the year, and numbers one to thirty-one.
